## PLEHOA Minutes Meeting of November 11, 2015

The regular monthly meeting of the Pine Lakes Estate Homeowners' Association was held on this date. President Charlie Matthews called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. In attendance, in addition to President Matthews were Vice President Pete Williams, Secretary Peter Talty, ARC Chair Bo Kromas, and Treasurer Dick Loubier. There were also 18 homeowners in attendance.

President Matthews opened the meeting and welcomed all those in attendance. There were two new homeowners present.

The Secretary's report was read and being no corrections, a motion was made and seconded to accept the report.

The Treasurer's report was read and being no corrections, a motion was made and seconded to accept the report. A full report is posted in the Clubhouse in the designated area across from the Exercise Room. ARC Report: There was one house painting request for 01B Bardmoor Court that was approved.

Vice President Williams read a letter from the Beautification Committee requesting a donation of \$100.00 in order to replace Christmas lights for the Clubhouse. The Board approved the request.

President Matthews updated the membership on the following issues:

- President Matthews and Vice President Williams re-checked the homes designated by ELS as being in need of cleaning as a result of the 360 inspections previously completed. They concurred with all of ELS' findings, but did not agree with the need for power washing of the areas on the peaks of some of the garages. It was pointed out that squirting with a regular hose should suffice.
- 2. The Toda house on 02F Bardmoor continues to be an eyesore and in great disrepair. This has been a chronic problem for several years. It will be brought up again at the liaison meeting tomorrow.
- 3. The replacement of the bridges has been delayed awaiting the proper permits.
- 4. Since there will not be enough Board members present for a quorum in December, there will be no meetings that month.
- 5. Complaints regarding lawn cutting should follow the procedure established by ELS and submit the form.
- 6. The Pub and Pro Shop will be closed next week Tuesday through Friday in order to complete the roof replacement.

- 7. Residents were encouraged to join FMO.
- 8. Two Board members (Charlie Matthews and Peter Talty) will need to be replaced next February when they complete their terms. Anyone interested in serving on the Board should contact Lew Ackley at 738-0191.

Issues from the residents:

- 1. There are two homes on Eagle Trace that are in bad shape if viewed from the rear, and the 360 inspections did not identify these homes.
- 2. 06F needs painting and the shutters are falling off.
- 3. The packet given out to new homeowners by ELS is inadequate and inaccurate. Much of the information was for Lake Fairways.
- 4. The roads around the community are unsafe at night, and the painting of a white line, especially on the curves, would be very helpful.

With no further issues to discuss, a motion was made and seconded to adjourn at 7:45 p.m.

The next meeting of the PLEHOA Board will be on Wednesday, January 6, 2016 and the general Membership meeting on Wednesday, January 13, 2016. Both meetings will be at 7:00 p.m. in the Living Room.

#### November Liaison Meeting By Judy Hale

The November meeting took place on November 12 in the Living Room. The first item on the agenda was the unreadable street signs. ELS is still getting quotes on repairing/replacing signs.

There was discussion about a tree on 51Q. ELS says the tree is not dead. Only dead or dangerous trees are removed by ELS. The resident is responsible for all other trees.

The plumbing pit next to the back door of the Pub was discussed again. Mulch will be added and possibly some flowers to make the area more attractive.

There was a long discussion about the sloppy work being done by ELS personnel, for example, 360 letters going to the wrong houses, furniture returned in reverse order, only unlocking one clubhouse door in the morning, poor cleaning, etc. We will see if the more closely supervised work gets results.

The above discussion led to the subject of resident concern forms. NO RESIDENT CONCERN FORM SHOULD BE IGNORED. The boards were assured that all forms will be answered in the future. Residents are reminded that the answers may not always be what they want to hear.

The Pub and the new manager were discussed. So far there are mixed reviews. The roof should be replaced this month.

The removal of the blinds on the clubhouse doors was the next topic. The fire marshal has scheduled a visit for the 13<sup>th</sup> to see if we are in compliance in all areas. Julie will see what we can to with the exit doors. A railing will be installed around the back patios to prevent golf cart parking in this area. Residents are ignoring the no parking signs put up by the fire marshal. It was requested that furniture repair be done on a timelier basis.

ELS will investigate the cracking of the pool deck. Estimates to repair the cracked and chipped tile are being requested. Also an estimated for more caulking will be obtained.

The cost of golf club membership at Pine Lakes and Lake Fairways is now the same however, Lake Fairways members are receiving a subsidy to bridge the first year due to the large increase they received. Both clubs should expect annual increases in the future. Julie is interviewing candidates for the golf pro position.

The bridge to Eagle Trace and the 10<sup>th</sup> tee will start as soon as an assessment is done and the permit issued.

The following items did not make the first cut for the 2016 budget: new card room furniture, fountains, surveillance cameras for pool and Pub/Pro Shop, redo of pool restrooms, redo of ballroom floor, and replacing the movable walls.

Residents are reminded to let their board members know if they would like items added to the agenda for these meeting.

A few decades after the initial enchantment, my sister Eloise had a friend living in Paris. Then airline prices dropped--so we found ourselves flying to The City of Lights. It was November...chilly weather was what we expected.

But the first few days were wonderful. Autumn was kissing the town with 50/60° weather. The trees were holding onto most of their leaves, while the leaves on the ground laid out a golden carpet for the tourists. We four--Eloise, her husband Rich, friend Andi and I--found ourselves at the Eiffel Tower, boating on the Seine, visiting Versailles, wandering the Louvre, gaping at Notre Dame, relaxing at the Luxembourg Gardens, being mesmerized by Monet's water lilies... So much to do...so much more to see.

By Friday November 13, we were exhausted and, having made other touristy plans for the weekend, we all retired by 9 p.m. Soon El and Andi had frantic messages on their Iphones asking if we were ok. Then thru the night El (their room faced the street) was hearing police sirens--yes, like in the movies. It wasn't until morning that we found out about the horrendous bombing.

Our wonderful hotel was roughly eight blocks from the Bataclan Theatre, the soccer stadium and the brasserie. The staff, indeed all the residents, were somber. We were across the street from the Assemblee National and around the corner from the Defense Ministry, so when we finally did venture out on the street, we found dozens of soldiers in full gear and machine guns. Anton, our concierge, could not have been more concerned for our safety. He made sure we did not go anywhere that would be unsafe. Of course our weekend sightseeing never happened because everything closed. When we could finally leave for home, security checks at Charles de Gaulle airport were incredibly tight.

So, I can't echo Ann Sothern's "the last time I saw Paris." It surely was a Paris for the 21st Century... still lovely but vulnerable to madmen.

the team's MVP was shortstop Dave Joseph. He played in every game and batted .718 His strong arm and great range allowed him to play a deep shortstop, covering extra ground for our defense. Dave led the team in triples with 5.

Catcher Cam Thomson was a dependable target for these and other throws which made opposing teams extracautious in their base running. In the championship game, Cam was 3 for 3 at the plate, as he was in the 13-12 playoff victory. He hit .444 for the season.
